It might have more to do with your personality than you think! I've been diving deep into the correlation between personality types and interface preferences, inspired by Gretchen Rubin's Four Tendencies theory.



Rebel

Rejects outer and inner expectations

Meets only outer expectations

"You can count on me; and I'm counting on you to count on me"

Questioner

The results showed a


correlation between a

up to the website








I also looked into eye

tracking data and discovered


that certain personality types

Now was the time to nerd out, as

further interviews revealed a pattern

of design preferences that correlated

to a person's personality type.

"I'm not going to be motivated by my own words, I want someone else to tell me."

"I don't want people to give me new things to be worried about." "I don't want to be responsible for it, I want the app to do it for me."

"I don't love when apps are like 'you're doing great.' It's just a bit condescending."

"It seems a bit condescending, because it feels like you're doing something for the owner of the app, not yourself"

"I don't like it when you have to click on things to get to other things."





Questioner

"I can't necessarily just do stuff on command."

"I'd like to learn for myself rather than just be told what to do. I like figuring stuff out for myself." "I like visuals. I like to be able to see something rather than it just all being words."

"I really like learning and getting new information."


"I want instant information. The information that I've downloaded this app to get, needs to be there bang on the first page."

"It could be fun if the app made those decisions for me, as long as I could switch them out if I wanted to."
