WHAT DO THEY DO?

Legislators: Represent Smithtown in the Suffolk County Legislature, creating laws and budgets for the county.

Town Council Members: Help make decisions and set policies for Smithtown, working with the Town Board.

Town Supervisor: Acts as the chief executive of Smithtown, overseeing daily operations and managing the budget.

Superintendent of Highways: Responsible for maintaining and repairing town roads, drainage, and public infrastructure.

Run for Office Q & A

Legistlator:

Q: What do legislators do?

A: They represent Smithtown in the Suffolk County Legislature, making laws and managing the county budget.

Q: What qualifications do you need?

A: You must be at least 18 years old, a U.S. citizen, and a resident of the district you wish to represent.

Q: Is this a paid position?

A: Yes, it is a paid position.

Q: Is this a full-time or part-time job?

A: It is considered a part-time position, though it often requires significant time and commitment.

Town Supervisor

Q: What does the Town Supervisor do?

A: The Supervisor is the chief executive of Smithtown, managing the town's operations and budget.

Q: What qualifications do you need?

A: You must be at least 18 years old, a U.S. citizen, and a resident of Smithtown.

Q: Is this a paid position?

A: Yes, the Supervisor receives a salary.

Q: Is this a full-time or part-time job? A: It is a full-time position.

Town Council Members:

Q: What do town council members do? A: They work on the Town Board to make decisions and set policies for Smithtown.

Q: What qualifications do you need? A: You must be at least 18 years old, a U.S. citizen, and a resident of Smithtown.

Q: Is this a paid position? A: Yes, it is a paid position.

Q: Is this a full-time or part-time job?

A: It is typically considered a part-time position, though it may require substantial time for meetings and other duties.

Superintendent of Highways

Q: What does the Superintendent of Highways do?

A: They are responsible for maintaining and repairing town roads and infrastructure.

Q: What qualifications do you need?

A: You must be at least 18 years old, a U.S. citizen, and a resident of Smithtown.

Q: Is this a paid position? A: Yes, it is a paid position with a set salary.

Q: Is this a full-time or part-time job? A: It is a full-time position.

UNDERSTANDING: *REGIONALIZATION* WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW

INTRO

There's a lot of talk—and confusion about regionalization in NY schools. It's not about closing schools or mandates. Instead, it's a voluntary plan from NYSED to help districts save money and prepare for possible budget cuts.

This section clears up the myths, explains the facts, and shows why it matters.

Let's get the story straight!

WHAT IS REGIONALIZATION?

It's a voluntary way for schools to work together and share resources, special education programs, subscriptions, etc. to save money and stay sustainable.

TOP 5 THINGS YOU SHOULD KNOW

1. It's Not Mandatory!

Schools can choose whether they want to participate.

2. NYSED is Leading the Way.

This is a plan from Commissioner Betty Rosa and her team—not Hochul or the Legislature.

3. Why Now?

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 State budget cuts could mean less funding for schools. NYSED wants to help districts prepare before it's too late.

4. It Will Save Money.

C Schools can combine services to lower costs and stretch their budgets further.

5. No School Closures, Merging, or Consolidation.

This is about helping schools thrive—not shutting them down.

LET'S CLARIFY SOME THINGS:

What People Say	True or False?	What's Really Going On
"All schools have to regionalize— it's mandated!"	False	Regionalization is entirely voluntary. Schools decide if they want to participate. No mandates.
"This is something Hochul or the Legislature is pushing."	False	Not true. This is an initiative by NYSED and Commissioner Rosa, separate from the Governor or lawmakers.
"They'll shut down schools or consolidate them if this happens."	False	The plan is to support schools by sharing resources, not to close them. Regionalization can help schools thrive.
"Regionalization will save schools money, though, right?"	True	Yes! By sharing costs for things like subscriptions, programs, and staff training, schools can save significantly.
"Emergency Regulations (ER) mean something is wrong."	False	ERs are common tools to quickly implement measures that help districts sooner rather than later.
"Why are they even talking about this?"	Good Question!	Budget cuts are likely, and NYSED is trying to help districts plan ahead so they can adapt and stay strong.

WHY SO MUCH MISINFORMATION?

Political Motivation

 Some groups may use this as an opportunity to attack NYSED or the state government claiming it's about control or overreach. It's not.

Resistance from Districts

- Some districts may resist sharing resources because of fear of losing autonomy or control. They won't.
- Larger or wealthier districts might worry they'll end up subsidizing smaller or poorer districts. They won't.

Lack of Understanding

- The concept of regionalization might be new to many, and without clear information, people may jump to conclusions or spread rumors.
- Fear of Change

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• Change is hard, especially when it comes to schools. Families and educators may worry about what regionalization could mean for their local schools.

Fellow Smithtown Democrats,

As we spend the remainder of 2024 celebrating the holidays with friends and family, and relaxing after a long campaign season, we must also begin looking to the future, both for our organization and the broader future of our party.
