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General information

Hewenden is located almost equidistant between Bingley, a small town in West Yorkshire, and Haworth, the historic home to the Bronte Sisters.

TRAVEL INFORMATION

How to get to Leeds / Bingley

By Train

Leeds Railway Station is one of the busiest transport hubs in the UK and supports many mainline routes across the country including

- **East Coast Main Line (Leeds Branch):** Terminates at Leeds. It provides high-speed, direct inter-city links to London King's Cross, Peterborough, and Doncaster, operated primarily by [LNER](#).
- **CrossCountry Route:** Connects Leeds directly to Scotland, the Midlands, and the South West of England. Major destinations include Edinburgh, Newcastle, Birmingham New Street, Bristol Temple Meads, and Plymouth.
- **TransPennine (Huddersfield Line):** Serves as a vital east-west link through Northern England. It provides high-frequency inter-city services to Manchester Piccadilly, Liverpool Lime Street, York, and Newcastle.
- **Settle-Carlisle Line:** Leeds serves as the southern terminus for this scenic railway, which runs via the Yorkshire Dales up to Carlisle

Trains from Leeds to Bingley run directly on the Airedale line operated by [Northern Railway](#), taking about 20 minutes. Services run frequently every 30 minutes.

Taxis from Bingley is about 10 mins and cost depends on the Taxi Company used. Here are a couple of options

By Air

Manchester, Edinburgh, Glasgow and Stanstead Airports have direct train links to Leeds Station. Birmingham International Airport requires a transfer to Leeds Station

Train from Stanstead airport to Leeds - 3 hours

Train from Manchester airport to Leeds - 2 hours

Train from Leeds to Bingley (the closest train station to the venue - 20 minutes)

By Car

Travelling from:

The South via M1 / M62 Cullingworth is approx 1 hour

The North East leave the A1M at J47, Cullingworth is approx 1 hour

The North West leave the M6 at J36, Cullingworth is just over 1 hour

What to do in the area

There are MANY local walks around Haworth and Bingley for all abilities of walkers

Some of these include

From Hewenden Mill
Walk up to Hewenden Viaduct
Walk through the woods to Goitstock waterfall

From Haworth, perched on a hill in the Worth Valley

The Brontë Waterfall Circular (3.6 miles | Moderate): This trail leaves the village and cuts across Penistone Hill Country Park to a sheltered, rocky valley. You can cross the reconstructed stone Brontë Bridge and see the "Brontë Chair" rock where the sisters sat to write.

Top Withens & Brontë Falls (7.3 miles | Moderate): An extension of the waterfall route that climbs higher onto the wild, windswept moors. It leads directly to **Top Withens**, the atmospheric, ruined farmhouse widely cited as the inspiration for the Earnshaw home in *Wuthering Heights*. It loops back past the Lower Laithe Reservoir

Haworth Heritage Trail (3 miles | Moderate): Created by the [Brontë Parsonage Museum](#), this loop focuses on the immediate history of the village. It guides you down the famously steep, cobbled Main Street, along the river valley, and back via an old packhorse route.

Penistone Hill Heritage Trail (1.5 miles | Easy): Perfect for a shorter, less strenuous walk. Located just above the village, this loop provides sweeping panoramic views of the moors and the Worth Valley without requiring a full trek into the high country

From Bingley

The Five Rise Locks Canal Walk (3 miles | Easy): An easy flat route starting at Bingley train station and heading north along the Leeds and Liverpool Canal towpath. It takes you directly past the Three Rise Locks and the famous **Bingley Five Rise Locks**, an 18th-century engineering marvel. It loops back via the river meadows.

St Ives Estate Circular (4.5 miles | Moderate): This trail explores a sprawling, historic country park just outside the town centre. It guides you past the St Ives Estate mansion, through ancient woodlands, around the scenic **Coppice Pond**, and up to the panoramic **Druid's Altar** rock formation.

Mylecharane's Wood & Shipley Glen (5.5 miles | Moderate): A beautiful route heading south-east from the town into the wooded gorge of Mylecharane's Wood. The path climbs gently onto the gritstone escarpment of Shipley Glen and can be extended to the historic [Bracken Hall House](#).

Bingley to Saltaire River Aire Walk (4 miles linear | Easy): A scenic linear riverside path that tracks the River Aire downstream. It takes you past Hirst Wood and terminates directly in the UNESCO World Heritage Site of **Saltaire village**, where you can catch a quick 4-minute train ride back to Bingley station.
