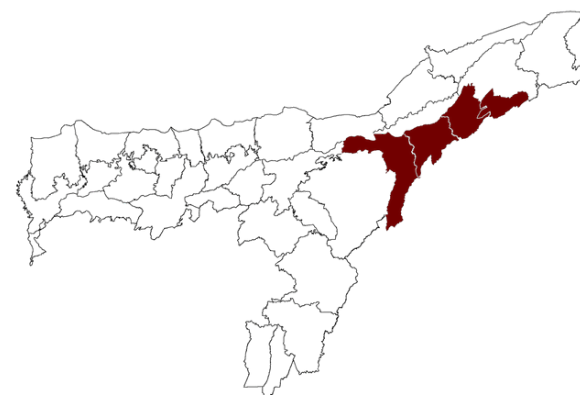

CURRENT SITUATION

- LOCAL has verified **26,400 families in urgent need** (21,000 families in Sivasagar, 2,400 families in Jorhat and 3,000 families across Golaghat and Charaideo districts)
- The death toll has risen to 68. Over 5.24 lakh people remain affected across Charaideo, Golaghat, Jorhat, Nagaon and Sivasagar. Sivasagar is now the worst-affected district with nearly 1.9 lakh people impacted. 354 relief camps and distribution centres are operational across four districts, sheltering 37,724 people.
- Floodwaters are gradually receding across Upper Assam. The focus has shifted to relief distribution, power restoration and medical deployment, with air-drops continuing in inaccessible areas. However, breached embankments and shallow waters are hampering both boat and vehicle access in several villages.
- As waters recede, a public health crisis is emerging in areas like Dergaon, with stagnant water, waste, snake infestations and disease risk. Residents are urgently calling for disinfectants, bleaching powder and health camps.

SAARATHI AND LOCAL RESPONSE

- Saarathi has supported a community-led initiative in Sivasagar district to support at least 100 tea garden families through rations for community kitchens and essential non-food items (NFIs).
- LOCAL member is providing shelter materials and dry rations to flood-affected families in Sivasagar.
- HAI, with support from Donatekart, is providing 500 hygiene and shelter kits to the most affected families in the Golaghat district.
- LOCAL member has provided ration materials and essential NFIs to 50 families each in Sivasagar and Jorhat districts, supporting a total of 100 flood-affected families.
- LOCAL member, with support from the Start Network, is supporting 1,500 flood-affected families (approximately 9,000 individuals) in the Dhemaji district with humanitarian relief.
- Tech4Aid is coordinating with the Assam State Emergency Operations Centre (SEOC) to complement government-led response efforts by supporting search and rescue operations and conducting rapid needs assessments using drone technology.
