BIG IDEA

God's Word provides the most trustworthy explanation for the world we live in.

OUTLINE

God calls me to...

1. Trust what He says about His creation (Job 40-41).
2. Evaluate evidence through biblical worldview.
3. Rest confidently in the God who made all things.

CALL TO RESPOND

1. Read difficult passages with humility rather than skepticism.
2. Compare competing worldviews honestly.
3. Trust Scripture even when culture disagrees.
4. Worship the Creator rather than His creation.

GROUP DISCUSSION

1. Before coming to group, think about areas where you've been told, "Science has disproved the Bible." What claims have most influenced your thinking? Share one with your group.
2. Read Job 40:15–24 and Job 41:1–34 together. What details surprised you most about Behemoth and Leviathan? Why do you think God devoted two entire chapters to describing these creatures?
3. Throughout Scripture, creatures like tannin and Leviathan appear in passages such as Genesis 1:21, Psalm 74, Isaiah 27, Jeremiah 51, and Lamentations 4. How do these passages shape your understanding of God's power and His created world?
4. The sermon contrasted two historical frameworks:
 - Creation → Fall → Flood → Babel → Extinction
 - Deep Time → Evolution → Millions of Years → Human Origins

DIRECT APPLICATION

1. Have you ever assumed that faith and science are enemies?
 - A. If so, what experiences shaped that assumption?
 - B. How did this week's sermon challenge or reinforce your thinking?
 - C. As a group, encourage one another to continue pursuing truth with both humility and confidence in God's Word.
2. Which of the sermon's questions helped you the most?
 - Why isn't "dinosaur" in the Bible?
 - Why are dragons considered mythical?
